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16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
17	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 10A O.S. 2011, Section 1-1-105, as
18	last amended by Section 1, Chapter 161, O.S.L. 2020 (10A O.S. Supp.
19	2020, Section 1-1-105), is amended to read as follows:
20	Section 1-1-105. When used in the Oklahoma Children's Code,
21	unless the context otherwise requires:
22	1. "Abandonment" means:
23	a. the willful intent by words, actions, or omissions not
24	to return for a child, or

b. the failure to maintain a significant parental relationship with a child through visitation or communication in which incidental or token visits or communication are not considered significant, or c. the failure to respond to notice of deprived proceedings;

7 2. "Abuse" means harm or threatened harm to the health, safety, or welfare of a child by a person responsible for the child's 8 9 health, safety, or welfare, including but not limited to 10 nonaccidental physical or mental injury, sexual abuse, or sexual 11 exploitation. Provided, however, that nothing contained in the 12 Oklahoma Children's Code shall prohibit any parent from using 13 ordinary force as a means of discipline including, but not limited 14 to, spanking, switching, or paddling.

15 "Harm or threatened harm to the health or safety of a а. 16 child" means any real or threatened physical, mental, 17 or emotional injury or damage to the body or mind that 18 is not accidental including but not limited to sexual 19 abuse, sexual exploitation, neglect, or dependency. 20 "Sexual abuse" includes but is not limited to rape, b. 21 incest, and lewd or indecent acts or proposals made to 22 a child, as defined by law, by a person responsible 23 for the health, safety, or welfare of the child.

"Sexual exploitation" includes but is not limited to 2 allowing, permitting, encouraging, or forcing a child to engage in prostitution, as defined by law, by any 3 person eighteen (18) years of age or older or by a 4 5 person responsible for the health, safety, or welfare of a child, or allowing, permitting, encouraging, or 6 7 engaging in the lewd, obscene, or pornographic, as defined by law, photographing, filming, or depicting 8 9 of a child in those acts by a person responsible for 10 the health, safety, and welfare of the child; "Adjudication" means a finding by the court that the 11 3. 12 allegations in a petition alleging that a child is deprived are 13 supported by a preponderance of the evidence; 14 4. "Adjudicatory hearing" means a hearing by the court as 15 provided by Section 1-4-601 of this title; 16 "Age-appropriate or developmentally appropriate" means: 5. 17 a. activities or items that are generally accepted as 18 suitable for children of the same age or level of 19 maturity or that are determined to be developmentally 20 appropriate for a child, based on the development of 21 cognitive, emotional, physical, and behavioral 22 capacities that are typical for an age or age group, 23 and

b. in the case of a specific child, activities or items
that are suitable for that child based on the
developmental stages attained by the child with
respect to the cognitive, emotional, physical, and
behavioral capacities of the specific child.

6 In the event that any age-related activities have implications 7 relative to the academic curriculum of a child, nothing in this 8 paragraph shall be construed to authorize an officer or employee of 9 the federal government to mandate, direct, or control a state or 10 local educational agency, or the specific instructional content, 11 academic achievement standards and assessments, curriculum, or 12 program of instruction of a school;

13 6. "Assessment" means a comprehensive review of child safety 14 and evaluation of family functioning and protective capacities that 15 is conducted in response to a child abuse or neglect referral that 16 does not allege a serious and immediate safety threat to a child;

17 7. "Behavioral health" means mental health, substance abuse, or 18 co-occurring mental health and substance abuse diagnoses, and the 19 continuum of mental health, substance abuse, or co-occurring mental 20 health and substance abuse treatment;

21 8. "Child" means any unmarried person under eighteen (18) years
22 of age;

9. "Child advocacy center" means a center and the multidisciplinary child abuse team of which it is a member that is

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1 accredited by the National Children's Alliance or that is completing 2 a sixth year of reaccreditation. Child advocacy centers shall be 3 classified, based on the child population of a district attorney's 4 district, as follows:

a. nonurban centers in districts with child populations
that are less than sixty thousand (60,000), and
midlevel nonurban centers in districts with child
populations equal to or greater than sixty thousand
(60,000), but not including Oklahoma and Tulsa
Counties;

11 10. "Child with a disability" means any child who has a 12 physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more 13 of the major life activities of the child, or who is regarded as 14 having such an impairment by a competent medical professional;

15 11. "Child-placing agency" means an agency that arranges for or 16 places a child in a foster family home, family-style residential 17 <u>living</u> program, group home, adoptive home, or a successful adulthood 18 program;

19 12. "Children's emergency resource center" means a community-20 based program that may provide emergency care and a safe and 21 structured homelike environment or a host home for children 22 providing food, clothing, shelter and hygiene products to each child 23 served; after-school tutoring; counseling services; life-skills 24 training; transition services; assessments; family reunification;

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respite care; transportation to or from school, doctors' appointments, visitations and other social, school, court or other activities when necessary; and a stable environment for children in crisis who are in custody of the Department of Human Services if permitted under the Department's policies and regulations, or who have been voluntarily placed by a parent or custodian during a temporary crisis;

13. "Community-based services" or "community-based programs" 8 9 means services or programs which maintain community participation or 10 supervision in their planning, operation, and evaluation. 11 Community-based services and programs may include, but are not 12 limited to, emergency shelter, crisis intervention, group work, case 13 supervision, job placement, recruitment and training of volunteers, 14 consultation, medical, educational, home-based services, vocational, 15 social, preventive and psychological guidance, training, counseling, 16 early intervention and diversionary substance abuse treatment, 17 sexual abuse treatment, transitional living, independent living, and 18 other related services and programs;

19 14. "Concurrent permanency planning" means, when indicated, the 20 implementation of two plans for a child entering foster care. One 21 plan focuses on reuniting the parent and child; the other seeks to 22 find a permanent out-of-home placement for the child with both plans 23 being pursued simultaneously;

1 15. "Court-appointed special advocate" or "CASA" means a 2 responsible adult volunteer who has been trained and is supervised 3 by a court-appointed special advocate program recognized by the 4 court, and when appointed by the court, serves as an officer of the 5 court in the capacity as a guardian ad litem;

6 16. "Court-appointed special advocate program" means an 7 organized program, administered by either an independent, not-for-8 profit corporation, a dependent project of an independent, not-for-9 profit corporation or a unit of local government, which recruits, 10 screens, trains, assigns, supervises and supports volunteers to be 11 available for appointment by the court as guardians ad litem;

12 17. "Custodian" means an individual other than a parent, legal 13 guardian or Indian custodian, to whom legal custody of the child has 14 been awarded by the court. As used in this title, the term 15 "custodian" shall not mean the Department of Human Services;

16 18. "Day treatment" means a nonresidential program which 17 provides intensive services to a child who resides in the child's 18 own home, the home of a relative, group home, a foster home or 19 residential child care facility. Day treatment programs include, 20 but are not limited to, educational services;

21 19. "Department" means the Department of Human Services; 22 20. "Dependency" means a child who is homeless or without 23 proper care or guardianship through no fault of his or her parent, 24 legal guardian, or custodian;

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1 21. "Deprived child" means a child:

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- a. who is for any reason destitute, homeless, or
  abandoned,
  - b. who does not have the proper parental care or guardianship,
- 6 c. who has been abused, neglected, or is dependent,
- d. whose home is an unfit place for the child by reason
  of depravity on the part of the parent or legal
  guardian of the child, or other person responsible for
  the health or welfare of the child,
- 11 who is a child in need of special care and treatment e. 12 because of the child's physical or mental condition, 13 and the child's parents, legal guardian, or other 14 custodian is unable or willfully fails to provide such 15 special care and treatment. As used in this 16 paragraph, a child in need of special care and 17 treatment includes, but is not limited to, a child who 18 at birth tests positive for alcohol or a controlled 19 dangerous substance and who, pursuant to a drug or 20 alcohol screen of the child and an assessment of the 21 parent, is determined to be at risk of harm or 22 threatened harm to the health or safety of a child, 23 f. who is a child with a disability deprived of the 24 nutrition necessary to sustain life or of the medical

1 treatment necessary to remedy or relieve a life-2 threatening medical condition in order to cause or allow the death of the child if such nutrition or 3 4 medical treatment is generally provided to similarly 5 situated children without a disability or children with disabilities; provided that no medical treatment 6 7 shall be necessary if, in the reasonable medical judgment of the attending physician, such treatment 8 9 would be futile in saving the life of the child, who, due to improper parental care and guardianship, 10 q. 11 is absent from school as specified in Section 10-106 12 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes, if the child is 13 subject to compulsory school attendance, 14 h. whose parent, legal guardian or custodian for good 15 cause desires to be relieved of custody, 16 i. who has been born to a parent whose parental rights to 17 another child have been involuntarily terminated by 18 the court and the conditions which led to the making 19 of the finding, which resulted in the termination of 20 the parental rights of the parent to the other child, 21 have not been corrected, or 22 whose parent, legal guardian, or custodian has i. 23 subjected another child to abuse or neglect or has 24 allowed another child to be subjected to abuse or

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neglect and is currently a respondent in a deprived proceeding.

Nothing in the Oklahoma Children's Code shall be construed to mean a child is deprived for the sole reason the parent, legal guardian, or person having custody or control of a child, in good faith, selects and depends upon spiritual means alone through prayer, in accordance with the tenets and practice of a recognized church or religious denomination, for the treatment or cure of disease or remedial care of such child.

Nothing contained in this paragraph shall prevent a court from immediately assuming custody of a child and ordering whatever action may be necessary, including medical treatment, to protect the child's health or welfare;

14 22. "Dispositional hearing" means a hearing by the court as 15 provided by Section 1-4-706 of this title;

16 23. "Drug-endangered child" means a child who is at risk of 17 suffering physical, psychological or sexual harm as a result of the 18 use, possession, distribution, manufacture or cultivation of 19 controlled substances, or the attempt of any of these acts, by a 20 person responsible for the health, safety or welfare of the child, 21 as defined in this section. This term includes circumstances 22 wherein the substance abuse of the person responsible for the 23 health, safety or welfare of the child interferes with that person's

1 ability to parent and provide a safe and nurturing environment for 2 the child;

3 24. "Emergency custody" means the custody of a child prior to 4 adjudication of the child following issuance of an order of the 5 district court pursuant to Section 1-4-201 of this title or 6 following issuance of an order of the district court pursuant to an 7 emergency custody hearing, as specified by Section 1-4-203 of this 8 title;

9 25. "Facility" means a place, an institution, a building or 10 part thereof, a set of buildings, or an area whether or not 11 enclosing a building or set of buildings used for the lawful custody 12 and treatment of children;

13 26. "Failure to protect" means failure to take reasonable 14 action to remedy or prevent child abuse or <u>heinous and shocking</u> 15 neglect, and includes the conduct of a nonabusing parent or guardian 16 who knows the identity of the abuser or the person neglecting the 17 child, but lies, conceals or fails to report the child abuse or 18 <u>heinous and shocking</u> neglect or otherwise take reasonable action to 19 end the abuse or heinous and shocking neglect;

20 27. "Family-style living program" means a residential program
21 providing sustained care and supervision to residents in a homelike
22 environment not located in a building used for commercial activity;
23 28. "Foster care" or "foster care services" means continuous
24 twenty-four-hour care and supportive services provided for a child

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1 in foster placement including, but not limited to, the care, 2 supervision, guidance, and rearing of a foster child by the foster 3 parent;

29. "Foster family home" means the private residence of a
foster parent who provides foster care services to a child. Such
term shall include a nonkinship foster family home, a therapeutic
foster family home, or the home of a relative or other kinship care
home;

9 30. "Foster parent eligibility assessment" includes a criminal 10 background investigation including, but not limited to, a national 11 criminal history records search based upon the submission of 12 fingerprints, home assessments, and any other assessment required by 13 the Department of Human Services, the Office of Juvenile Affairs, or 14 any child-placing agency pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma 15 Child Care Facilities Licensing Act;

16 31. "Guardian ad litem" means a person appointed by the court 17 pursuant to the provisions of Section 1-4-306 of this title having 18 those duties and responsibilities as set forth in that section. The 19 term "guardian ad litem" shall refer to a court-appointed special 20 advocate as well as to any other person appointed pursuant to the 21 provisions of Section 1-4-306 of this title to serve as a quardian 22 ad litem;

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32. "Guardian ad litem of the estate of the child" means a
 person appointed by the court to protect the property interests of a
 child pursuant to Section 1-8-108 of this title;

33. "Group home" means a residential facility licensed by the
Department to provide full-time care and community-based services
for more than five but fewer than thirteen children;

7 34. "Harm or threatened harm to the health or safety of a 8 child" means any real or threatened physical, mental, or emotional 9 injury or damage to the body or mind that is not accidental 10 including, but not limited to, sexual abuse, sexual exploitation, 11 neglect, or dependency;

59. "Relative" means a grandparent, great-grandparent, brother
or sister of whole or half blood, aunt, uncle or any other person
related to the child;

7 60. "Residential child care facility" means a twenty-four-hour 8 residential facility where children live together with or are 9 supervised by adults who are not their parents or relatives;

10 61. "Review hearing" means a hearing by the court pursuant to 11 Section 1-4-807 of this title;

12 62. "Risk" means the likelihood that an incident of child abuse 13 or neglect will occur in the future;

14 63. "Safety threat" means the threat of serious harm due to 15 child abuse or neglect occurring in the present or in the very near 16 future and without the intervention of another person, a child would 17 likely or in all probability sustain severe or permanent disability 18 or injury, illness, or death;

19 64. "Safety analysis" means action taken by the Department in 20 response to a report of alleged child abuse or neglect that may 21 include an assessment or investigation based upon an analysis of the 22 information received according to priority guidelines and other 23 criteria adopted by the Department;

65. "Safety evaluation" means evaluation of a child's situation
 by the Department using a structured, evidence-based tool to
 determine if the child is subject to a safety threat;

66. "Secure facility" means a facility which is designed and operated to ensure that all entrances and exits from the facility are subject to the exclusive control of the staff of the facility, whether or not the juvenile being detained has freedom of movement within the perimeter of the facility, or a facility which relies on locked rooms and buildings, fences, or physical restraint in order to control behavior of its residents;

11 "Sibling" means a biologically or legally related brother 67. 12 or sister of a child. This includes an individual who satisfies at 13 least one of the following conditions with respect to a child: 14 the individual is considered by state law to be a a. 15 sibling of the child, or the individual would have been considered a sibling 16 b. 17 under state law but for a termination or other

18disruption of parental rights, such as the death of a19parent;

20 68. "Specialized foster care" means foster care provided to a 21 child in a foster home or agency-contracted home which:

a. has been certified by the Developmental Disabilities
Services Division of the Department of Human Services,
b. is monitored by the Division, and

c. is funded through the Home- and Community-Based Waiver Services Program administered by the Division;

"Successful adulthood program" means a program specifically 3 69. 4 designed to assist a child to enhance those skills and abilities 5 necessary for successful adult living. A successful adulthood program may include, but shall not be limited to, such features as 6 minimal direct staff supervision, and the provision of supportive 7 services to assist children with activities necessary for finding an 8 9 appropriate place of residence, completing an education or 10 vocational training, obtaining employment, or obtaining other 11 similar services;

12 70. "Temporary custody" means court-ordered custody of an 13 adjudicated deprived child;

14 71. "Therapeutic foster family home" means a foster family home 15 which provides specific treatment services, pursuant to a 16 therapeutic foster care contract, which are designed to remedy 17 social and behavioral problems of a foster child residing in the 18 home;

19 72. "Trafficking in persons" means sex trafficking or severe 20 forms of trafficking in persons as described in Section 7102 of 21 Title 22 of the United States Code:

a. "sex trafficking" means the recruitment, harboring,
 transportation, provision, obtaining, patronizing or
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soliciting of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act, and

- "severe forms of trafficking in persons" means: b. 3 sex trafficking in which a commercial sex act is 4 (1)5 induced by force, fraud, or coercion, or in which the person induced to perform such act has not 6 7 attained eighteen (18) years of age, or (2) the recruitment, harboring, transportation, 8 9 provision, obtaining, patronizing or soliciting 10 of a person for labor or services, through the 11 use of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose
- 12 of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, 13 debt bondage, or slavery;

14 73. "Transitional living program" means a residential program 15 that may be attached to an existing facility or operated solely for 16 the purpose of assisting children to develop the skills and 17 abilities necessary for successful adult living. The program may 18 include, but shall not be limited to, reduced staff supervision, 19 vocational training, educational services, employment and employment 20 training, and other appropriate independent living skills training 21 as a part of the transitional living program; and

74. "Voluntary foster care placement" means the temporary placement of a child by the parent, legal guardian or custodian of the child in foster care pursuant to a signed placement agreement

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1	between the Department or a child-placing agency and the child's
2	parent, legal guardian or custodian.
