12	ACEs and PACEs Awareness Day in Oklahoma, in conjunction with Child Abuse Prevention Month, to highlight the impact of trauma and the importance of prevention and community resilience through trauma-
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14	informed care.
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17	WHEREAS, the landmark Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) study
18	from the late 1990s brought attention to the powerful impact that
19	negative childhood experiences have on future health and
20	functioning, and demonstrated the importance of gathering
21	information early in the lives of children and their families and
22	designing early intervention programs that target abuse and neglect;
23	and

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1 WHEREAS, ACEs are stressful or traumatic experiences that 2 include abuse, neglect, and household instability and are recognized 3 as a proxy for toxic stress, which can affect brain and body 4 development; and

5 WHEREAS, ACEs are determinants of major public health problems 6 in Oklahoma, such as heart disease, substance abuse, and mental 7 illness. Detrimental effects can be buffered by building resiliency 8 and promoting protective factors (PACEs) in a child's life through 9 early intervention; and

10 WHEREAS, the conservative annual cost of ACEs nationally is
11 estimated to be \$750 billion; and

WHEREAS, at least 25% of Oklahoma's children have experienced two or more ACEs and one in six adults have experienced four or more ACEs; and

WHEREAS, trauma-informed care is an approach that can bring greater understanding and more effective ways to prevent, identify, and support and serve children, adults, families, and communities affected by ACEs, trauma, adversity, and toxic stress; and

WHEREAS, research has identified at least 10 protective factors (PACEs) including having a caring, competent adult in one's life, having a hobby, participating in after-school activities and organized sports, volunteering and helping others, having a safe and clean home, having enough food to eat, having access to appropriate school resources and academic support needed to learn; and

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1 WHEREAS, trauma-informed care is being promoted and established 2 in many of Oklahoma's urban and rural counties and communities. Βv adopting trauma-informed approaches that build resilience and 3 promote protective factors in all public, private, and charter 4 5 schools, workplaces, communities, and government programs, training and licensing can aid in preventing mental, emotional, physical, and 6 social issues for people impacted by ACEs, trauma, adversity, and 7 toxic stress; and 8

9 WHEREAS, in 2018, the Oklahoma Legislature unanimously passed 10 Senate Bill No. 1517 to establish the Trauma Informed Task Force to 11 identify, evaluate, recommend, maintain, and update a set of best 12 practices with respect to children and youth, and their families as 13 appropriate, who have experienced or are at risk of experiencing 14 trauma, especially adverse childhood experiences.

CONCURRING THEREIN:

18 THAT the Oklahoma State Legislature designates April 7, 2022, as 19 ACEs and PACEs Awareness Day in Oklahoma, in conjunction with Child 20 Abuse Prevention Month, to highlight the impact of trauma and the 21 importance of prevention and community resilience through trauma-22 informed care to reduce children's exposure to adverse childhood 23 experiences, address the facts of those experiences, and build and

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1	promote resilience and protective factors while investing in
2	preventive health care and mental health and wellness interventions.
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
