**Research Analysis**

HB1629 clarifies that people convicted of a felony should be eligible to register to vote when they have fully served their sentence or their sentence has been discharged, received a commutation to reduce the sentence to time served, received a commutation for a crime that has been reclassified to a misdemeanor, or have been granted a pardon.

**Fiscal Analysis**

HB 1629 allows persons convicted of a felony to be eligible to register to vote after specific criteria have occurred to the individual's sentence or conviction. Per the State Election Board (SEB), if this measure would be timed to coincide with the regular printing of new applications, it would have an estimated cost of less than \$1,500 to the agency.
