7	An Act relating to schools; amending 70 O.S. 2021,
8	Section 1210.545, which relates to annual reports for the Oklahoma School Testing Program; updating
9	cards to include certain minimum number of indicators
10	of enrichment and support opportunities and staffing experience and retention; providing an effective
11	date; and declaring an emergency.
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13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
14	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 1210.545, is
15	amended to read as follows:
16	Section 1210.545. A. Except as otherwise provided, as part of
17	the accountability system developed as provided for in Section
18	1210.541 of this title, the State Board of Education shall prepare
19	annual reports of the results of the Oklahoma School Testing Program
20	which describe student achievement in the state, and each school
21	site, pursuant to the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965
22	(ESEA) as reauthorized by P.L. No. 114-95, also known as the Every
23	Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), and any related federal regulations.
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1 The annual report as required pursuant to subsection A of Β. 2 this section shall identify school sites as having one of the 3 following grades for each indicator, separately, and by a single 4 overview grade of all indicators, defined according to rules of the 5 State Board of Education: 6 1. "A" means schools making excellent progress; 7 2. "B" means schools making above average progress; 8 3. "C" means schools making satisfactory progress; 9 "D" means schools making less than satisfactory progress; 4. 10 and 11 5. "F" means schools failing to make adequate progress. 12 С. Each school that has students who are tested and included in 13 the school grading system as provided for in this section shall 14 receive a school grade, except as follows: 15 1. A school shall not receive a school grade if the number of 16 students tested and included in the school grading system is less 17 than the minimum sample size necessary for statistical reliability 18 and prevention of the unlawful release of personally identifiable 19 student data. The State Board of Education is directed to establish 20 the lowest minimum sample size necessary to meet the requirements of 21 this paragraph; and 22 2. The academic performance of students who are enrolled full-

time in an online program that is offered by a school district or charter school that is not the district of residence or is not

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<sup>1</sup> located in the district of residence of the student shall be <sup>2</sup> reported separately by the school district or charter school and <sup>3</sup> shall not be included when determining the grade of the school site <sup>4</sup> or charter school.

D. The State Board of Education may adopt alternate systems of accountability for statewide virtual charter schools, alternative education programs as defined in Section 1210.568 of this title, and schools serving only grades prekindergarten or kindergarten through two.

E. The grade of a school shall be based on a multimeasures approach to accountability in accordance with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) as reauthorized by P.L. No. 13 114-95, also known as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and any federal regulations that include, but are not limited to, the following indicators:

16 1. Statewide assessments, including the establishment of 17 student performance bands;

18 2. Graduation rates for high schools;

19 3. Statewide academic measures for elementary and middle 20 schools;

4. English language proficiency for English learners; and
 5. At least one additional statewide measure of school quality
 or student success, including, but not limited to, school climate,

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<sup>1</sup> school safety, student engagement, educator engagement, and/or
<sup>2</sup> advanced coursework and postsecondary readiness.

F. Of the indicators included in subsection E of this section, not less than seventy percent (70%) of the overview grade must be given to indicators 1, 2, 3, and 4 and, in the aggregate, with not more than thirty percent (30%) of the grade given to indicator 5.

G. Further, the grade of an elementary or middle school site shall include, but not be limited to, a measure of status for English language arts (ELA), math, and science, growth in ELA and math, English Language Proficiency Assessment language proficiency assessment (ELPA) progress, and chronic absenteeism.

12 Η. The grade of a high school site shall include, but not be 13 limited to, a measure of status for English language arts (ELA), 14 math, and science status, English Language Proficiency Assessment 15 language proficiency assessment (ELPA) progress, graduation rate, 16 chronic absenteeism, and postsecondary opportunities. For purposes 17 of this section, postsecondary opportunities shall include Advanced 18 Placement advanced placement, International Baccalaureate, dual and 19 concurrent enrollment, internships, mentorships and apprenticeships, 20 and industry certifications. The Board shall adopt a time line 21 timeline for moving from completion of such opportunities to 22 crediting achievement of such opportunities.

I. The annual report shall identify the performance of each school as having improved, remained the same, or declined. This

1 school improvement rating shall be based on a comparison of the 2 student and school performance data of the current year to the 3 previous year data.

4 J. 1. The State Department of Education shall annually develop 5 a school site report card to be delivered to parents throughout each 6 school district. The report card shall be in accordance with the 7 requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 8 (ESEA) $_{\tau}$  as reauthorized and amended by P.L. No. 114-95, also known 9 as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and includes the grade for 10 the school, information regarding school improvement, an explanation 11 of school performance, and indicators of return on investment. The 12 report card for each school site shall be published annually by the 13 Department on its website, and every school district shall provide 14 the school site report card to the parent or guardian of each 15 student enrolled in the school site. In order to provide 16 information regarding school performance for school report cards 17 issued during the 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 school year, the 18 Department shall include an explanation of the changes to the 19 statewide system of student assessments as required in Section 20 1210.508 of this title and how the transition in assessments may 21 impact school performance. The Department shall issue school report 22 cards using the 2016-2017 school year assessment data that is 23 available.

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1	2. The school site report card published on the Department's
2	website and provided to the parent or guardian of each student
3	enrolled in the school site pursuant to paragraph 1 of this
4	subsection shall include a minimum of five (5) indicators of
5	enrichment and support opportunities such as the following:
6	a. programs offered for gifted and talented students,
7	b. foreign language course offerings,
8	c. whether the school site has an active parent teacher
9	association or parent teacher organization,
10	d. science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM)
11	course offerings,
12	e. intergenerational programming offerings,
13	<u>f.</u> apprenticeship, internship, and mentorship offerings,
14	g. before-school and after-school programming
15	availability,
16	h. extracurricular activities available, and
17	i. mental health support.
18	3. The school site report card published on the Department's
19	website and provided to the parent or guardian of each student
20	enrolled in the school site pursuant to paragraph 1 of this
21	subsection shall include a minimum of three indicators of staffing
22	experience and retention such as the following:
23	<u>a.</u> the percentage of teachers with more than three $(3)$
24	years of teaching experience,

1	b. the percentage of teachers who have been employed by
2	the school site for more than three (3) years,
3	c. the percentage of teachers with National Board
4	certification or post-graduate degrees,
5	d. the percentage of teachers with an emergency or
6	provisional certificate, as provided for in Section 6-
7	187 of this title,
8	e. the percentage of teachers who are adjunct teachers,
9	as provided for in Section 6-122.3 of this title, and
10	f. the length of time the school site principal has been
11	in his or her position.
12	K. The Legislature may factor in the performance of schools in
13	calculating any performance-based funding policy that is provided to
14	public school districts.
15	L. The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules to
16	implement the provisions of this section.
17	SECTION 2. This act shall become effective July 1, 2025.
18	SECTION 3. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
19	of the public peace, health, or safety, an emergency is hereby
20	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
21	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
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
